
## Who can play Chess with the Grooming Boys?



The Rotary Club of Pretoria East has teamed up with Moves for Life (MFL) to enhance the life skills learning in the Grooming Boys project. This initiative uses chess as a tool for education, which helps improve maths, science and problem-solving in children. Club member Eben initiated the project and obtained sponsorship from Jan, Patrick, Cheryl, Robin and Mariana in addition to his own contribution to purchase 20 Chess Sets for Grooming Boys at the Eersterust Senior Secondary School.

MFL uses chess as an educational tool, and teaches learners mathematical skills, science and life orientation skills and also enhances Language Development. MFL unlocks the cognitive potential of children through structured implementation of chess education, where chess principles are intentionally linked to mathematics, science, language and life skills.

MFL has also partnered with academic institutions and their research has shown that via chess there is an improvement in the mathematical skills as well as self-confidence, communication and risk-taking of the children.

Since implementation, Moves for Life has had success at more than 150 schools. Since 2011 more than 1010 educators were trained to teach children the Moves for Life formula.
